# 5 Common Business English Mistakes and How to Fix Them!



### JAPANESE ENGLISH

Think carefully before using a word that is similar in Japanese and English (Imagination/イメージ or Theme/テーマ). These words will likely confuse non-Japanese speakers. Examples include:

- アンケート
- ノルマ
- テーマ

### CAN YOU? VS. DO YOU?

In general, "can you" is used to talk about ability (Can you play the piano?), but for some cultural questions, it sounds like a challenge to native speakers (Can you eat sushi? or Can you use chopsticks?). Instead, use "Do you..." to ask about cultural ability. For example:

- Do you speak Japanese?
- Do you eat raw fish?

### **DON'T USE TAKE TOO MUCH!**

取る is a great verb in Japanese. In English, though, it's not used as much. A few common mistakes are:

- Take an appointment
- Take dinner
- Take a reservation

# COUNTABLE VS. UNCOUNTABLE NOUNS

### **ALMOST!**

When you want to talk about nearly all things or people in a certain group (or the world) you can use **almost all** plus a plural noun.

• Almost all people like pizza.

When you want to talk about nearly all things or people in a **certain** group, you can use **almost all of** plus a plural noun.

 Almost all of my friends like to eat pizza.
