

AUGUST OPEN WORKSHOP Prepositions of Time



In business, it is important to be **clear** and **precise** when you are talking about **time**. Company employees often need to explain or agree when something will happen. For example, you may be planning to meet with a colleague or a client, or you might need to schedule a production or design process. Whatever the situation, you will need to know when to use '**prepositions**', those small but important words 'in', 'on' and 'at' and when **not** to use prepositions. Let's take a look!

IN

We use 'in' with:

- parts of the day (except 'night') in the morning / in the afternoon / in the evening
- months in January, in February, in March, in April etc.
- seasons in spring, in summer, in autumn/fall, in winter
- years in 1868, in 1964, in 2017, in 2025 etc.

Example sentences:

- Sales increased by 4 % in February.
- I'm busy all morning. Let's meet in the afternoon.
- Micron acquired Lexar Media in 2006.



ON ('on' is always used with a single, specific day: on one day!)

We use 'on' with:

- days of the week on Monday, on Tuesday, on Wednesday etc.
- dates on January 4th, on March 20th, on August 28th, on November 16th etc.
- **special / named days on** Children's Day, **on** New Year's Eve, **on** The Emperor's Birthday etc.
- **the weekend on** the weekend (US)

Example sentences:

- The meeting scheduled for today has been postponed and will now take place on Friday.
- Micron Technology Inc. was founded on Oct. 5, 1978
- On New Year's Day, I usually visit a temple with my family.



AT

We use 'at' with:

- clock time at 3 pm, at 2:45, at noon etc.
- meal times at lunch, at dinner etc.
- holiday periods of more than one day at Christmas, at New Year etc.
- the weekend at the weekend (UK)

Example sentences:

- I have a bath every night at about 8:30.
- Let's have a chat about this at lunch.
- I usually buy presents for my family and friends at Christmas.









Prepositions of Time



NO PREPOSITION

We don't use a preposition with:

• 'special' time words - 'yesterday', 'tomorrow', 'today' or 'tonight'

We also don't use a preposition with the words:

- 'last', 'this', 'next', or 'every' last Monday, this week, next month, every January, last spring, this year
- 'this', 'every' this morning, every afternoon, this evening (NB We don't usually use 'last' or 'next' with these words)

Example sentences:

- I spoke to the CEO last Monday.
- The new machinery should arrive tomorrow morning.
- I'm giving my sales presentation **next** month.
- I'm working in Tokyo this week.
- The visitors from Boise will arrive later today.
- I found out about it **yesterday**.
- I have to write a report for my manager every month.
