



ACTIVE VOICE

We use **active voice** or **passive voice** to organize the content of a sentence. The **active voice** is the usual word order with the subject first. It is more **direct** as the **subject does the action** of the verb in the sentence.

- The airline **cancelled** my flight. (The focus is on the airline and the action it does)

PASSIVE VOICE

We use the **passive voice** to **change the focus** of a sentence. The person or thing that the action was done to **becomes the topic or theme**. The subject can be left out, or it can be placed at the end using "by + subject".

- My flight **was cancelled**. (The focus is on the flight and what happened to it)

USES OF THE PASSIVE

- to focus on the most **important** or most **logical information**, such as the action or what happened to certain people or objects.
- when we prefer **not to mention who or what does the action** (e.g., it's not known, it's not important, it's obvious, or we don't want to say).
- when we talk about **scientific processes** or how something is done.
- in **formal or scientific writing**, such as technical papers, academic essays, or reports.

HOW TO MAKE THE PASSIVE

The passive is formed using the verb "**to be**" and a **past participle**. The form of "to be" **changes** to make the verb tense. The past participle stays **the same**. The subject is **omitted** if it's unnecessary.

Active: Someone **cleans** the windows.

Passive: The windows **are cleaned**.

EXAMPLES OF PASSIVE SENTENCES

Present Simple

- The test data **is collected** during the experiment.
- Our smartphone cameras **are checked** every day as we enter and leave the building.

Past Simple

- Micron **was founded** in Boise in 1978.
- The VIPs from Boise **were met** at the airport.

Present Continuous

- The Capable ERG meeting **is being held** in the cafeteria.



EXAMPLES OF PASSIVE SENTENCES

Past Continuous

- The accident happened while a new tool **was being installed**.

Present Perfect

- A lot of Good Catch cases **have been submitted** to the EHS department.

Past Perfect

- The excursion happened because the quality procedure **had not been followed**.

Future Simple

- A lot of new employees **will be hired** next spring.

Infinitive

- Posters in English need **to be checked** before they are displayed onsite.

Modal

- The reticle **must be delivered** by the Fab Need Date.
- The deadline **can be met** if everyone works hard.

Modal Perfect

- The tool **should have been checked** before they started production.
- The excursion **could have been avoided** if he had read the SOP.
